**Progress of the Hatechiya**

**A** GENERAL meeting of the Hatechiya section of the Jewish Guild was held on the 19th ult., Mr. Ginsberg presided. He regretted that the section was not receiving more support from Jewish Guild members and also from Zionist Youth Societies in Johannesburg.

The speaker claimed that the Hatechiya was doing excellent work by offering facilities to the whole of the Jewish youth to become acquainted with Jewish matters. The Hebrew classes had an uninterrupted record for five years existence. The position, however, to-day was serious and a new influx of members was desirable, otherwise it would be difficult to carry on—especially with the Hebrew classes.

The Chairman expressed appreciation to the Executive Council of the Jewish Guild for its most valuable co-operation. A vote of thanks was expressed to Dr. A. Birnbaum and Mr. W. Rybko, the Hebrew teachers and lecturers for their valuable services. A discussion took place upon a number of matters affecting the welfare of the Hatechiya.

An Interesting Debate at Parktown.

**T**HE Parktown and Saxonwold Branches of the Women's Zionist League held a joint function on Tuesday, 31st ult., at the residence of Mrs. A. Abelheim. Between 50 and 60 members were present.

The function took the form of an inter-debate, the subject of debate being “That the community is better served by the family rather than the communal upbringing of the child.” Mrs. L. Sowden, of the Saxonwold branch, moved, and in the course of a really brilliant address pointed out that the latest legislation in Russia tends towards the strengthening of the family group. Mrs. Katzen, of the Parktown Branch, opposed most ably and stressed the fact that in the present social structure the vast majority of children would get from a communal upbringing the many advantages that the economic position of their parents prevents them from getting in their homes. Mrs. Edelstein and Mrs. Hellman seconded for and against.

Before the debate commenced Mrs. Katzen made a presentation of 19 trees to Mrs. E. Hayman on behalf of the B'not Zion of Cape Town in token of Mrs. Hayman's splendid services there during the 1934 Women's Keren Hayesod Campaign.

Mrs. Katzen also initiated a most interesting scheme when she presented one tree each to Mrs. Hellman and Mrs. Maisels on the occasion of the birth of their respective daughter and son. It is hoped that all branches of the W.Z.L. will adopt this idea of presenting a tree to such of their members as give birth to children.

The debate aroused great interest and only lack of time prevented many members from defending their particular points of view when the debate was thrown open to the floor. Speakers from the floor were Mesdames Newman, Mayer, Gordon, Hayman and Ordman. The motion was put to the floor and adopted.
